Dear Brian,

I may have more surprises for you. As I traced your family back, it dawned on me that they seemed to be a very old Newcastle family. That being the case it is necessary to give you a quick history lesson.

The walls of Newcastle were built in 1265 and more or less comprised of the parish of St. Nicholas. A census of the occupants within the wall, was taken in 1665 and showed that there were 7 Turnbull households (see overleaf). My ancestor John leads to Turnbull's Nook, a small piece of land in St. Johns parish, which meant that I could trace my particular branch back to 1500. It is probable that all 7 households were related and go back to that period.

I have written a book on the subject ( not yet found a publisher), which is why I had all of the relevant information to hand.

Now back to your branch. You will recall that I had found an Edward, son of Edward, bapt. 21 May 1705 at St. Nicholas non. con. I have since discovered the marriage of the parents; Edward Turnbull married Eliz. Emmerson 13 Nov. 1698 St. Nicholas. More important I found the baptism of their first son, Cuthbert, bapt. 13 Sept. 1699 at St. Nicholas non con.

There was a great tradition in Scotland and north east England that the first son would be named after the fathers father, or grandfather on the male side. This meant that I was looking for an Edward born circa 1670, son of Cuthbert. There it was, made to order Edward, son of Cuthbert and Mary bapt. 27 Jan. 1675 All Saints. Now I need a Cuthbert born circa 1645, none in Newcastle.

Checked Durham county, more in hope, but there he was Cuthbert, son of Mark Turnbull bapt.8 Feb.

1646 at Gateshead St. Mary's Although in different counties St. Mary's and St. Nicholas are only 200 yards apart, across the river Tyne.

The marriage of Mark was another bonus, he married Mary Barker 1 June 1641 at St. Nicholas. This of course places him within the walls of Newcastle before the 1665 census and is undoubtedly Mark Turnbull, one of the original 7, named overleaf.

The only Mark baptised before this time was at Chester le St. in 1616. Correct age but only guesswork.

## Newcastle Householders in 1665

When the Newcastle walls were built in 1265, the town was divided into 24 wards, with each ward having its own tower. As the walls were 7 feet thick and up to 25 feet high in parts, a great deal of maintenance was required. Every householder had their own specified parts to defend and fortify.

A census or headcount was made in 1665. There were 7 Turnbull householders living within the walls. They were probably all related but John Turnbull of Stank Tower ward was almost certainly the g.g.g.grandson of Henry from Turnbull's Nook as he was known to be a house carpenter in the St. Nicholas area.

The areas of responsibility designated to the Turnbull's were as follows;

\*John Turnbull; Stank Tower Ward. East end of Gallowgate, Denton Chare, Iron market to St. Nicholas church. John, a direct descendant of Henry, married Elizabeth Henderson in 1660 at St. Nicholas church.

Thomas Turnbull; Gunner Tower Ward. From Side to Dean Street, Milburn House to Dog Leap stairs.

John Turnbull; Westgate Ward. West of Westgate Road to Bath Lane, including St. John's churchyard to Denton square. (This area also covered Turnbull's Nook.)

Cuthbert Turnbull; Morden Tower. St. Nicholas Square and Town Hall.

George Turnbull; Nun's Gate; Newgate St. Lowe Friar St. and Percy St.

Charles Turnbull; St. Nicholas Square to cloth Market to High Bridge.


\* Mark Turnbull; Northumberland Street and Pilgrim Street to High Friar Lane.

The population within the walls at this time was estimated as 12,000. At least 40 of them were Turnbull's.

Pure speculation of course, but many of the marauding Scots were members of the Turnbull clan from Roxburghshire For this branch of the Turnbull's to be trusted with the upkeep of the Town walls, suggests that they had lived in the area for some time. Possible descendants of Robert 1412, with property at the Close or Henry circa 1500 from Turnbull's Nook.

Your Mark would be aged circa 50. He was having children within the walls of Newcastle between 1640/50

Almost certainly the same person








All Saints, St. Andrews and St. Nicholas are all Newcastle C of E. churches with their own parishes, so your family were living there before 1700. They also baptised non conformists seperately. There were manybchoices for non cons. such as Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and a few others. They chose to be Independant Congregationalist, which is new to me. Your direct ancestors;


Why the question marks? There is a possible alternate route through the same family.

There is no way I can be positive which of the two brothers is your direct ancestor, but we know that from William 1731 and beyong is your direct line.
Lonbenton parish is adjacent to Newcastle. It shares a border with All Saints and is less than i mile from St. Andrews. Longbenton did not have a non. con baptismal church so residents would have to cross into Newcastle to keep their faith. Best Wishes Albert
